

glendale Church News The sale of the Glendale Church building is moving along in a very slow and orderly process. It looks like we will have possible use of the church for hybrid services and special events for most of 2023 if we want to stay there. Their present plan is to continue to get some of the physical repair work completed before it goes on the market, in particular the replacement or reconditioning of the metal roof on the addition. GNC has funding to do that work, but it will take some planning to get it started. Gloria says that we will be continuing to take reservations for weddings at least through the end of 2023. We will be notifying the denomination of the building sale status in case there is any interest there.

THE CALENDAR Here is a list of events scheduled between now and the end of the year. All times listed are eastern time zone. Cincinnati hosted services are identified by the worship leaders of the golden font, and are at 11am. A new addition is Rev. Ron Brugler has agreed to lead the October 16th service, which allowed us to finalize Rev. Sherrie's service on October 30th. The usual 1st-3rd-5th worship schedule will end at the end of November. Last issue's Bible Jumble solution: (The picture clue hinted that the key words were related to flowers.) Key words were: Violet, Pansy, Clover, Aster, and Begonia Gnu·man said, "Mark and Matthew often tell the same stories, but there is a difference. Mark provides ______." The answer was "a longer version."

"A striking way in which Mark does not look like an abridgement of Matthew is the fact that the individual

sections within it don't tend to be shorter than the parallels in Matthew. Instead, they tend to be longer. Mark typically uses more words to tell a given story about Jesus than Matthew does. For example, the number of words employed by Mark to tell the stories of the Gadarene Demoniac (Mark 5:1-20), Jairus' Daughter (Mark 5: 21-43), and the Feeding of the Five Thousand (Mark 6:30-44) are respectively 325, 374 and 235; Matthew contrives to tell them in 136, 135 and 157 words." Nevertheless, the whole book of Matthew, though it would have fit on one scroll, is about 60% larger than Mark since it has a lot of things in it that are not in Mark at all.

WRAPPING UP 2022 Hopefully everyone is getting a chance to enjoy the fall colors, though in Florida that color, I have been informed, is green. It is a weird-weather fall, for sure. Hurricane Ian was an extremely bad hurricane, leaving a tragic mess on the left coast of Florida, and historic lingering floods northeast of Orlando. The drying up of the Mississippi River is from lack of rainfall in the Ohio River Valley. We've had less than ½ inch in Cincinnati in October. And winter forecasts? – drier than usual in the South, wetter in Ohio.

But with Zoom, the weather outside (as long as it stays outside) won't bother New Church of Montgomery congregations. We'll continue with hybrid services for a while, but we may go to Zoom-only if it gets impractical to travel to Glendale for in-person gatherings. The Board has asked that a poll be taken of Cincy area folks about how we want to proceed going forward. We will be considering three options: (1) Keep doing what we're doing now, hybrid when practical for Sunday worship and for special events. It allows locals to gather, which some of us do now. NCOM rents the space whenever we use GNC, though at a very friendly rent. (2) Only do Zoom for Sunday worship, but keep using the church for special events. That saves a little cash. We could probably sell the AV equipment. There is a trade-off for online vs. onsite worship, logistics is easier, socializing is restricted, and unison / responsive features are awkward. (3) Cut financial ties with GNC and do everything online, making special arrangements for locations (could be GNC) for any special events we continue to have in-person.

As to the rest of the 2022 calendar, the pulpit schedule is fixed, Eileen will contact you about Harvest Feast coming up in November, with a physical meal at GNC and maybe one in Florida, too. November / December community events are being looked at now... Adopt-A Family for Christmas, a winter coat project for Glendale Elementary that will allow the school to have warm coats to share with children to enjoy recess safely, and a holiday book sale in cooperation with Blue Manatee Literacy Project and Bethany. We are also exploring helping out Beech Acres (a foster child placement agency) - a new idea that may not happen right away, if found practical. Monetary donations can support these programs where volunteering doesn't make sense.

What's New in Religion? Besides the Lord making all things new all the time, what in the world's going on?

The acting general secretary of the World Council of Churches met recently with Patriarch Kirill, the Russian Orthodox Church head who has drawn global criticism for lending spiritual support for Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Kirill agreed that churches should be peacemakers, Christians should not "support wars and killings" that "war cannot be holy," and insisted churches "must not add fuel to the fire."

Pope Francis used strong words to criticize the mistreatment and abandonment of migrants during a mass where he canonized Italian Bishop Giovanni Battista Scalabrini, making a saint the priest known as the Father of Migrants. "The exclusion of migrants is criminal, it lets them die before our eyes." Francis noted over 3,000 migrants died in the Mediterranean Sea during their journey toward Europe in 2021.

The United Methodist Church is going through a split over sexuality. The prospect of permitting same-sex marriages and the ordination of openly gay clergy resulted in a "Global Methodist Church" break-away being launched in May when the denomination's General Conference, which planned to address the issue, was delayed to 2024. Expected 1500 churches to exit this year, with perhaps 3000-5000 exiting next year, after 2023 exiting congregations cannot retain their property, which is owned by the denomination. There are over 32,000 United Methodist Church congregations in the U.S.
